HIV-1 Origin

The SV-40 cancer virus was found naturally in certain African monkeys, and it found its way into humans via the polio vaccines used in the 1950s. But it wasn't the only monkey virus that contaminated the Salk and Sabin polio vaccines. Simian Immunodeficiency Virus (SIV) went along for the ride with its larger SV-40 cousin. SIV viruses were so small that they slipped through the filters used to trap and dispose of larger viruses. Furthermore, scientists thought *retroviruses* (like SIV) were harmless, so they ignored them. In their search for a vaccine to fight cancer, scientists exposed SV-40 viruses to heavy doses of radiation, deliberately causing mutations, which yielded ever more virulent strains of cancer viruses. But it is logical to assume that SIV viruses were also being exposed to the same radiation at the same time, and that they mutated as well. Therefore, it is logical to assume that HIV-1 is a mutated cousin of SIV, and that the American cancer research lab was the birthplace of the still-rapidly mutating HIV-1 virus.
